Coles County Conservationist of the Year: Urban Butterfly Initiative



UBI was chosen as the Coles County SWCD's Conservationist of the Year for 2022 due to their work beautifying the communities in Coles County via the creation of numerous butterfly-friendly habitats in existing public greenspaces around Charleston, Mattoon, and the surrounding areas. They have done a wonderful job coordinating with community, nonprofit, and grassroots groups such as the City of Charleston, Pheasants Forever, CCAR Industries, Camp

New Home, 5-Mile House, Eastern Illinois University, and more to identify sites for habitat projects, promote community involvement through educational and volunteer opportunities, and continually increase public knowledge about the natural flora and fauna of the Coles County area through their annual "Butterfly Blitz" event. To date, UBI has created and maintains approximately 20 "hotspots" in the area. These project sites are active demonstrations of conservation and stewardship, provide ongoing opportunities for educational programs, research, and promote the use of best management practices in public, urban green spaces.

The Urban Butterfly Initiative is a 501(c3)/509(a2) community service organization that provides expertise and guidance to public and private partners who seek to increase biodiversity, beauty, and scientific awareness in their communities. UBI encourages the modification of existing urban green spaces to create beautiful butterfly-friendly habitats, making them more ecologically functional, while also generating the benefits of urban beautification, tourism, education, and science. Their low-cost, low-maintenance butterfly landscapes beautify communities, increase biodiversity and conservation, create engagement and educational experiences, and provide science and research opportunities.

Have You Submitted Your 2022 STAR Field Forms? They're due January 31st!



Saving Tomorrow's Agriculture Resources (STAR) is a FREE nationwide tool to assist farm operators and landowners in evaluating their nutrient and soil loss management practices on individual fields. The goal of STAR is to encourage the con-

tinued adoption of conservation practices, and recognize farmers for their commitment to sustainability.

The STAR evaluation system assigns points for management activities on an annual basis. Participants answer a series of simple questions about their crop rotation, tillage, nutrient applications, and use of conservation practices to generate their overall field score. Scores are converted to a STAR rating of 1 to 5 STARs, with 5 STARs indicating commitment to a suite of practices proven to improve soil health and water quality.

There are several ways to complete a STAR evaluation—Complete and return the PDF form via email, mail, or in-person, or use the STAR Web App that launched in 2021. The web app has the ability to work on both large and small screen devices, and is the fastest option for tech-savvy folks. It provides users with immediate, clear, concise evaluations of their field management. Additionally, it automatically identifies practices to increase a field's STAR Rating, providing a clear path to improved STAR Ratings with resources and local technical assistance.

The Coles County SWCD is looking forward to increased participation in the free and confidential program for the 2022 crop year.
